Bookings are essential for these programs on 8555 7000.



Also as mentioned last month the 10th Cittaslow International General Assembly will be held in Goolwa from 9-12th May. It will be a very busy time in Goolwa and for those organising these events.

This being History Month I thought this little story may be appropriate. It is not Goolwa history exactly but SA History.

This is the story of ARMBRUSTER, UHLMANN, & BURING – Tobacconists Adelaide. My interest in the story is that Johann Frederick Martin ARMBRUSTER married my Grandfather's sister, Emma Richardson nee Esselbach. They were both widowed and married 11th January 1893.

Fred, as he was known arrived in the Colony c1851 and like many others mistakenly thought he could make his fortune in the Victorian goldfields. By 1855 he was back in SA and entered the tobacco trade which he had learned in Hamburg, Germany. In 1857 Mr H.C. Ulmann joined Fred, the business then becoming F. ARMBRUSTER & ULMANN. In 1878 Rudolph Buring was admitted to the partnership after working for the firm for 20years. After Armbruster's death in 1897 Buring became the sole proprietor of the business. They had shops in Grenfell, King William & Rundle streets.

Some people may remember the three-quarter life size statue that sat astride a cane chair in the window of their Rundle Street shop, and was a feature of their shops from the time it was purchased in 1859 until c1969. A descendant of Mr Buring said that from time to time the statue got them into trouble with local constabulary, who would mistake him for a burglar when doing their rounds. 'He' was once "arrested" when he had been moved under the shop's stairs during renovations. A burglar alarm went off, and a sergeant searching the premises spotted a shoe poking out under a dustsheet. The long arm of the law slapped down on the "boy's" shoulder as the miscreant was apprehended!

Whenever 'he' was taken out of the shop window for repairs, a sign would go up saying "Gone Fishing"
