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Welcome to the autumn edition of Alexandrina Alive.

I'm excited to say after years of advocacy by Council and the community we finally have two pedestrian refuge crossing on the main street of Middleton.

Goolwa Road is a State road and while Council was pleased to take on the project management to deliver the works, funding of \$380,000 was provided by the Department for Infrastructure and Transport (DIT).

The structures are pedestrian refuge-style crossings, not zebra crossings so they don't stop traffic. But as we have seen in other towns such as Goolwa, the centre refuges make it much safer for pedestrians to traverse two lanes. DIT has confirmed that additional funding may be considered in future grant rounds for additional crossings in our towns.

As Mayor, I am also pleased that we have completed the streetscaping component of the Strathalbyn Town Centre Revitalisation.

Some final works at intersections were delayed until after the busy summer holiday period, but we now have a town centre that is a more connected, pedestrianfriendly environment.

We have new paving, bike racks, additional car parks, seating, larger and safer alfresco areas, a viewing deck overlooking the Soldiers Memorial Gardens, lighting, and green areas to encourage visitors to explore.

Strathalbyn – 185th anniversary

185 years ago, a group of Scottish settlers heeded early explorers' praise about the lands around the Angas River and crossed the Mount Lofty Ranges to make their home in the valley they dubbed 'Strath' 'Albyn'.

Strath was the Gaelic term for 'valley with a river' and founding pioneer Dr John Rankine wanted a link to the Albion Iron Mills in Glasgow where he had key business interests.

Today Strathalbyn is a growing regional centre of nearly 8,000 people that has endured the ups and downs of gold rushes, droughts, and changes in transport and agricultural practices. This year the community is planning a range of events to celebrate their 185th anniversary. You can find these events on our website on the Community Noticeboard.

Before the settlement, Strathalbyn was known as Munarown or Muneroo by the two First Nations peoples who shared a border in this district, the Ngarrindjeri who lived in the lands to the south and the Peramangk who lived in the lands to the north.

Strathalbyn was the first town in SA (and one of only a few in Australia) settled by Scots and it became a major centre for the colony. Its early prosperity has been attributed to its location on the main intercolonial route between Adelaide and Victoria, and the profile and influence of its early community leaders.

Between 1855 and 1888, 10 men from Strathalbyn were elected to State Parliament and six served terms as either Chairman or Mayor of the Strathalbyn District Council.

Volunteers love history

Ever wondered whose face is depicted in plaster above the entrance to the Strathalbyn Town Hall?

It's The Bard of Avon, William Shakespeare, and you can thank the volunteers at Council's Local and Family History Room for researching the answer back when the history collection opened its doors in the recently renovated Library and Community Centre in November 2011.

According to founding volunteer Carolyn Tucker, it was the first public query directed to the team which numbered just herself and Jim Caspers.

Now Carolyn is part of a team of seven with Andrea Crawford, Deb MacAllan, Caroline Dennis, Kathy Gambling, Coralie Nicolson, and Bronwyn Holdsworth.

They come into the history room at different hours on different days to collaborate their many different skills ranging from genealogy and digital

archiving to building an impressive collection of land title information and local history research.

The most common public query directed to their team from the community is "who used to live in my house/or business?". Carolyn can relate. Living in the historic Strathalbyn home Sandergrove – home to five generations of the same family – had sparked her interest in local history.

When Council opened its renovated premises in Strathalbyn in 2011 the plans included a history room and Carolyn volunteered her time so she could contribute to the community and be with likeminded people.

She's still there and says the team who volunteer their time all enjoy their work collating, researching, protecting, and sharing the history of the district.

Golden Tour Down Under glory for mighty Middleton

It was a gold medal win for Middleton which claimed the overall title of Best Dressed Town across all the stages of the 2024 Santos Tour Down Under (TDU) international cycling event.

Alexandrina hosted the Hahn Men's Stage 4 on Friday 19 January with Middleton taking out the stage win and Artworx Gallery and Gifts in Goolwa winning the Santos Best Dressed Commercial or Community Property on the day.

All the towns along the Stage 4 route embraced the Santos TDU spirit with more than 20 businesses and organisations running associated events. But it was Middleton's surfboardthemed decorations, celebrating the community's surf culture history, that caught the eye of TDU judges.

With some assistance from a Council events grant, the Middleton Town & Foreshore Association (MTAFA) volunteers put in many hours creating promotional bikes, banners and welcoming signs.

They also organised a free community sausage sizzle in the Main Street, complete with live music, so everyone in town could enjoy the festive atmosphere.

The MTAFA plans to use its prize money for community art projects to bring joy to the community and its many visitors.

Let the games begin! Stage 2 now complete

Work is now finished on Stage 2 of the Goolwa Oval Recreation Precinct.

The renewed tennis and netball courts are ready for the netball season with modern acrylic surfaces, new lighting, spectator shelters and chain mesh fencing.

The Lions Club of Goolwa's new 'book market' building is move-in ready with a fresh feature brick façade, an expansive open plan layout, storage and sorting areas, a kitchen, office area and an accessible toilet.

Council has fitted out the store with carpet and tiled floors, airconditioning and a feature ceiling in Colorbond material. We've also provided some library shelving to assist the club with setting up.

The entry boulevard has been landscaped with advanced trees and plants complementing the multi-colour exposed aggregate pedestrian paths which provide direct access to the oval and recreation grounds.

Manicured grass areas adjoin the boulevard, court shelters and new shade sail-covered playground area.

A spectator mound links the oval and sports courts with the main clubroom building and change rooms.

Late last year the new cricket practice nets and a shared storage facility were finished for the cricket season and grassed areas are being established beside the new public toilet facility. This space will provide open play space for the community.

Stage 2 marks the competition of a combined \$8.2M project to upgrade the Goolwa Oval Recreation Precinct.

The Australian Government contributed \$5 million towards the project with the State Government providing \$800,000 from the Round 2 of the Grassroots Football, Cricket and Netball Facility Program and Council funding of \$2.4M.

Book market opens in new Lions' den

For 30 years the 'book market' at the Goolwa Oval has been the major fundraiser for the Lions Club of Goolwa.

Lions Secretary Tony Snelson welcomed the shelving, saying members were excited about the reopening and were in discussions about a new name for their popular 'book market'.

The new-look 'book market' is in the oval precinct and can be accessed from Wildman Street.

Recycling wastewater for the oval

A significant portion of the civil works at the Goolwa Oval Recreation Precinct is underground, playing a vital role in a managing stormwater while also irrigating the oval.

In the past much of the runoff from the tennis and netball courts would pond where the old cypress trees were located on the Hutchinson Street entrance. Now the stormwater is directed via grates and pipes into 36 metres of detention culverts and then pumped through 350 metres of pipe into the wetland beside the oval.

The wetland catchment recycles water back to the oval.



Advanced Care Directives (ACDs) provide people over the age of 18 with the legal right to make decisions in advance about their future health, end-of-life care and to appoint substitute decisionmakers to make these decisions on their behalf if they are not able to communicate their wishes.

The ADC form has been designed as a 'do-it-yourself' document.

Our specially-trained volunteers can assist with general information.

Forms and kits are also available free of charge from our offices.

Assistance with ACDs is part of the Fleurieu Advance Care Directive Project, a partnership with Alexandrina, the City of Victor Harbor and the District Council of Yankalilla with support from Office of Ageing Well.

Bin service renewal

It's time to renew your paid additional bin service.

Current services expire on 30 June 2024. To ensure continued service, please reapply to renew your paid additional bin service now.

Don't forget to attach your new sticker before your next collection.

If you need extra waste collection, the Fleurieu Regional Waste Authority (FRWA) offers additional paid kerbside collection services.

Additional services are available across the general waste, yellow and green recycling streams.

The 2024–2025 fees have been kept the same as last financial year.

Yearly fees for placing an extra yellow or green recycling bin out with your usual fortnightly recycling collection are \$120.

An additional general waste collection will cost \$200 a year.

Customers are also responsible for purchasing and maintaining their additional bins.

Come and see Yuntulun Ku:li-war at the Signal Point Experience Centre

The renewal of Goolwa's iconic Signal Point building as a multi-purpose experience centre is almost complete with the new exhibition 'Yuntulun Ku:li-war' now open.

'Yuntulun Ku:li-war' – which translates to 'Coming together on the headland' in Ngarrindjeri – tells the stories of the First Nations people of this area, the early settlement history of Goolwa as a major river port and the ecology of the Murray Darling River system.

The exhibition is the jewel in the crown of the revamped Signal Point Experience Centre, a project that has been funded by Alexandrina Council and the Australian Government, including a grant from the Murray Darling Basin Economic Development Program.

Set sail for 2025 SA Wooden Boat Festival

Council has confirmed the dates for the next SA Wooden Boat Festival to be held in 2025.

Save the date for the weekend of 26 and 27 April 2025 with the event returning to the Goolwa Wharf where upgrades are scheduled to be completed in late 2024.

After successfully securing \$50,000 in State grant funding for two biennial events in late 2024 and early 2026, the SA Tourism Commission has agreed to a SA Wooden Boat Festival Committee request to change the timing to April 2025 and April 2027.

Land purchase secures future of wastewater treatment in Mount Compass

Alexandrina Council has bought a 17.8-hectare parcel of land on the outskirts of Mount Compass to secure the future management of the town's wastewater.

The purchase of Lot 1 Berry Road, located just 2.5km from the town centre, was finalised in January.

The site is 500 metres from Council's existing wastewater treatment plant on Sandmine Road.

The land was once quarried for sand so half the site is already cleared and largely level, making it of Environment and Water, community representatives Frank Tuckwell and Roland Bartlett, Exhibition Studios, Urban Mind Studios and Procure PM.

ideal for wastewater infrastructure expansion, which was confirmed by an independent engineering report.

The strategic purchase will ensure the sustainability of wastewater treatment for residents in Mount Compass.

The additional land will allow Council to plan sustainable irrigation solutions for the Mount Compass community, and provide additional wastewater treatment capacity for any future growth in Mount Compass.

Strategic land purchases for Community Wastewater Management Systems (CWMS) across the region are included in Council's Long Term Financial Plan.

Council's CWMS operates under legislation requiring it to be costrecoverable and self-funded, so existing users and future network users pay for wastewater services.

Jumping into jetty works

Repair work on the historic Port Elliot Jetty received a jump start in late February with the State Government announcing a \$174,000 contribution through its SA Jetties Renewal Program.

The popular jetty, built in 1852 at Horseshoe Bay, was closed after being damaged in a storm in early 2023.

The damage was initially thought to be minor, but investigations revealed significant structural loss to several pylons and bracing.

Council initially allocated \$230,000 for the jetty's immediate remediation in the 2023/24 Budget. The additional State funding meant Council could address not just the structural issues identified after the storm but other parts of the jetty where contractors advised repairs would be critical in the next decade.

The additional work is expected to secure the long-term future of the jetty.

Port Elliot Jetty is owned by the Government of South Australia but leased by the Alexandrina Council, which is financially responsible for repairs and maintenance.

Latest on 2022 Middleton storm event

On 12 November 2022, South Australia experienced a major storm event which caused widespread damage across the greater Alexandrina Council area.

Significant flooding occurred within the Middleton township.

Following a community meeting, Council engaged an engineering firm to conduct a Hydrology Report to summarise the flood modelling and assessments in the flood-affected areas of Middleton and provide options for future mitigation.

Council received the report in late 2023 and invited the community to attend an Information Session on 12 February 2024 where the engineering firm made a presentation.

The firm advised that there were advantages and disadvantages for all proposed mitigation options because many involved privately owned land or State Government infrastructure.

A further Community Information Meeting was held in Middleton on 13 March 2024.

At the meeting, Chief Executive Officer Nigel Morris committed that the Council team would meet with flood-affected residents to gain a firsthand perspective of the impact of the storm event to inform further flood mapping and future mitigation options.

Project Updates

Ashbourne Stormwater Mitigation

Alexandrina Council has committed funds in the 2023-2024 Budget, funded through the Federal Government's Local Roads & Community Infrastructure Program, for the design and delivery of infrastructure which will improve stormwater management in Ashbourne.

Stormwater modelling was conducted in March 2024. This involved the use of a drone for LiDAR surveying. LiDAR surveying is critical in understanding how water moves through the area and what infrastructure is needed to manage this.

Concept designs are expected to be drafted in May with detailed construction drawings to be completed in August.

The modelling and design process will assist Council in establishing what infrastructure solution is appropriate before Council considers construction.

Clayton Bay streetlighting

A Smart Street Lighting Trial was recently run in Clayton Bay over the summer.

The trial was a first for SA Power Networks and officially started in mid-January with a review in mid-March before switching over to a winter lighting schedule.

Based on regular lighting surveys and community feedback during the trial, Council believes the summer lighting schedule was set at a minimum and achieved a balance between Australian street lighting standards and the low-light aspirations of those in the Clayton Bay community.

Council received positive feedback from the Clayton Bay community. Some residents commented on the positive effect on local wildlife, noticing that the frogs in the local lagoon were particularly vocal. The winter schedule will be different to accommodate the end of Daylight Savings and will be monitored, both by Council and the community, to identify further improvements.

Cleland Gully Road culvert

The damaged stormwater infrastructure on Cleland Gully Road at Tooperang has been repaired.

These works included excavating and repairing the pipe section, bitumen repairs and works to the culvert.

Safety railing is scheduled to be installed by April 2024. Traffic controls will be in place for the duration of the safety railing installation.

Goolwa Wharf Precinct

Work on the seawall at the Goolwa Wharf Precinct began in February and is scheduled for competition in the coming months.

The State Heritage-listed Wharf Shed has been dismantled. Each individual component of the shed was identified through 3D scanning and was taken off-site to be restored.

The components will be reassembled in the second quarter of 2024.

The dismantling of the wharf structure began in late January 2024.

The work will be done in stages to minimise impacts to business operations.

Deconstruction and construction works will occur from the deck, and from the water.

Work on the Dunbar Road car park is complete.

Work has started on the Amelia Park car park, and footpath upgrades throughout the precinct.

Langhorne Creek Discovery Trail

Community consultation on the concept plans for the Langhorne Creek Discovery Trail was undertaken from mid-February to mid-March, with around 75 responses received.

Council is in the process of collating and reviewing the feedback to inform amendments to the proposed plan that will accompany a grant application for Federal funding.

The community consultation responses, amended plans and outcome of this grant application are expected to be presented to Council in the coming months.

Strathalbyn Town Hall Upgrade

The Strathalbyn Town Hall upgrade is a project aimed at creating a multi-functional facility catering for a diverse range of activities and events to promote social activation and improve benefits to the local and surrounding community.

The project commenced in early 2023 with completed and in progress works including an extension of the stage, fully refurbished toilets, external and internal painting, reconfiguring front of house, installation of platform lift for stage access, new balcony floor layout and installation of solar panels.

Remaining works include the installation of new air conditioning in the main auditorium, additional A/V, stage lighting and associated controls and provision of a new building access system. Works are programmed for completion in the second quarter of 2024.

The streetscape component of the Strathalbyn Town Centre Revitalisation project is now complete.
