Background

Council has a long term approach to growing its economy by supporting local business, fostering an environment that creates jobs; and importantly, assisting the area to grow sustainably.

Council is currently reviewing its 2016 – 2022 Economic Development Strategy and will now consider the effects of current external environmental issues (COVID-19); and importantly, the opportunities that will arise, with a focus on re-building through a much anticipated recovery phase. The future focus and themes of the revised strategy will also be informed by community feedback received from Council’s Alexandrina 2040 strategic planning initiative.

The Coronavirus was declared a pandemic by the World Health Organisation on 11 March 2020. A pandemic is viewed as a disease that is spread in multiple countries at the same time. Since then, it has had a devastating effect on the global community’s social, health and economic wellbeing.

Council recognised the immediate crisis facing our region, and has taken the necessary steps to protect our community and reduce the risk of infection, guided by Federal and State government agencies.

The negative impact on our business sector, and the subsequent impact to the local community is significant. Council has therefore put in place a range of measures and initiatives to complement Federal and State government stimulus packages so as to give business the best chance of ‘surviving’ the economic downturn.

This Alexandrina Council Business Support Package outlines a range of initiatives utilising the legislative and administrative powers Council has at its disposal to support business in times of crisis. It also outlines a series of new programs to leverage other external support available for business to ensure our region gets its ‘fair share’ of support, and is prepared for the much anticipated re-building phase.

Alexandrina Economy – Exposure to Impact

Independent analysis has been undertaken on the impact of COVID-19 on the local Alexandrina Economy based on a number of assumptions.

The analysis considered the direct and broader impact of a decline in tourism, government imposed restrictions and fluctuations on global commodity markets for key sectors within Alexandrina such as wine production and sales. Modelling the combination of these three elements indicates an overall shrinking of the Gross Regional Product (GDP) by \$94.3 Million for the period April to September 2020. This represents a decline of 7.6% based on 2018-19 GDP.

Modelling also indicated a potential loss of 933 jobs in the same period, which equates to a 12% decline in employment in the Alexandrina region based on 2018-19 figures. This modelling does not take into account Federal and State government support packages such as the recently announced JobKeeper Payment, as the long term effect of these initiatives is not yet known, however it is anticipated that they will have a positive impact on business viability.

Council has a role to play in supporting the local economy. It is evident that this forecast impact is evolving as many local businesses have already started terminating staff resulting from cancellations of visitor bookings, reduced customer numbers and reduced sales/orders.

Other stimulus packages – Federal and State Government

As a result of a taking a measured, calculated approach to immediate business support and more longer term potential actions, Alexandrina Council has had the benefit of considering Federal and State Government stimulus package announcements. This has assisted in determining gaps in support and identifying the additional levers Council can utilise. The Federal and State Government support currently available is summarised in **Table 1**.

Government Body	Name of Stimulus Package	Summary
Federal	JobKeeper Payment	The subsidy is the central plan in a \$130 Billion economic stimulus package. Businesses impacted by coronavirus will be able to access a subsidy from the Government to continue paying their employees. Affected employers will be able to claim a fortnightly payment of \$1,500 per eligible employee from 30 March 2020, for a maximum period of 6 months.
Federal	Increase in the Instant Asset Write-Off	The higher Instant Asset Write-Off (IAWO) threshold provides cash flow benefits for businesses that will be able to immediately deduct purchases of eligible assets each costing less than \$150,000. The threshold applies on a per asset basis, so eligible businesses can immediately write-off multiple assets.
Federal	Boosting cash flow for employers	A \$15 Billion package to enable small lenders to continue supporting Australian consumers and small business. Through the ATO, the Government will provide tax-free cash flow boosts of between \$20,000 and \$100,000 to eligible businesses.
Federal	Rent Relief Scheme	Evictions will be put on hold over the next 6 months for commercial and residential tenancies in financial distress, who are unable to meet their commitments due to the impact of the coronavirus. Under the scheme, landlords will have to reduce the cost of leases in proportion to the reduction in the tenant’s business. The waivers will have to account for at least 50 per cent of the reduction in business. Deferrals – rental payments that will need to be made, but can be put off – must be spread over the remaining time of a lease and for no less than 24 months. Therefore if a tenant had three months remaining on a lease, they would still have at least a year to make any deferred rent payment.
State	Business and Jobs Support Fund	A \$300 Million fund to support individual businesses and industry sectors directly affected by coronavirus, that face potential collapse – and the loss of thousands of jobs – as a result.
State	Community and Jobs Support Fund	A \$250 Million fund to support community organisations, sporting, arts and recreational bodies, non-profit organisations as well as some industry sectors whose operations have been impacted by the coronavirus. Will also help with training of South Australians seeking new skills and employment, and to assist organisations meet increased demand for services including emergency relief.
State	\$10,000 ‘one off’ emergency cash payment for small business initiative	To be eligible a business must: <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Employ people in South Australia• Have a turnover of more than \$75,000• Have payroll of less than \$1.5 million, and not be entitled to a payroll tax waiver under COVID-19 support measures introduced by the State Government• Have an ABN and been carrying on the operation of a business in SA on 1 March 2020• Have been subject to closure or highly impacted by COVID-19 related restrictions• Use the funds to support activities related to the operation of the business. Applications for the grant will be available until 1 June 2020.

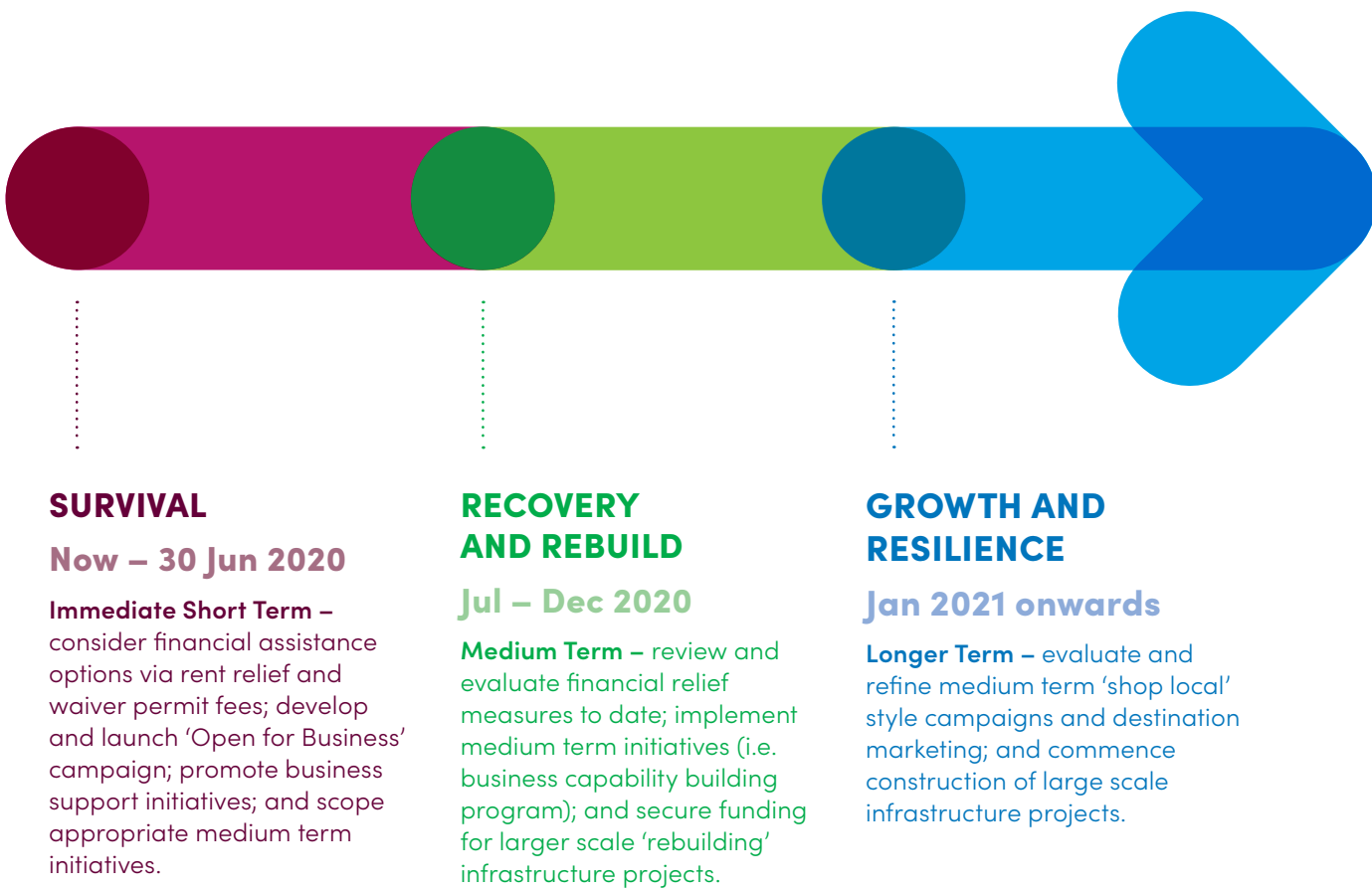
Comparative Analysis

In forming this Business Support Package, Council researched and considered other councils who have already announced relief and support initiatives, and compared a range of factors such as population, number of businesses and economic profile, risk to their industries, size of annual Council budgets, and percentage of budget to the level of relief provided.



This package covers immediate relief initiatives for the short term (now to June 2020), activities focused on survival and recovery in the medium term (June 2020 – December 2020) and more strategic project progression in the longer term (2021 onwards) to position businesses for growth and resilience.

This will be achieved by attracting large tourism and related infrastructure investment to ensure when people start travelling again, Alexandrina is well positioned to attract increased visitation and investment.



Financial Assistance

Business Fee Waiver

Council collects a range of fees for permits, licences and services rendered. Council has waived licences and permits fees that apply to businesses within the Alexandrina Council boundary as an immediate support response. This applies from 1 April to 30 June 2020. As the COVID-19 situation evolves, an evaluation of impact will help determine whether a further extension is necessary.

Council acknowledges that in the overall cost of running a business, these fees are relatively minor costs associated with operations, but small amounts do add up over time, and in such extenuating circumstances all cost reductions no matter how small help.

Based on 2019-20 the value of this action is summarised in **Table 2** below:

Notes regarding the Business Fee table include:

Outdoor dining permits will be refunded 25% of the annual fee representing an April to June rebate which equates to approximately \$5,000 in total value.

Food safety inspections were most recently undertaken during the period October 2019 to February 2020. Inspections will not be undertaken again until October 2020 with any fees due between April and June 2020, waived.

This \$5,630 business relief component of the Business Support Package will apply to businesses within the Alexandrina Council boundary only.

Rent Relief

Council deferred rent payments immediately on announcement of the pandemic in recognition of the potential of significant tenant hardship. On 20 April 2020, Council endorsed a comprehensive support package once more detail was known about other government support initiatives.

Tenants of council owned buildings are a significant income source for Council, contributing approximately \$770,000 per annum to operations.

An early announcement on 29 March 2020 from the Federal government indicated that “States and territories will be moving to put a moratorium on evictions of persons as a result of financial distress if they are unable to meet their commitments. And so there will be a moratorium on evictions for the next six months under those rental arrangements”.

The Local Government Association released practice guidance notes on 3 April 2020 for “COVID19 – Commercial and Community Leases – Requests for Financial Assistance from Tenants and Managers” to assist Council’s to make appropriate determinations.

Since then, the Federal Government has announced a Rent Relief Code of Conduct (The Code). The Code outlines a set of good faith leasing principles for commercial tenancies including:

- Retail
- Office
- Industrial.

Between:

- Owners
- Operators
- Other landlords
- Tenants.

The Code applies to tenants that are a small-medium sized business with an annual turnover of up to \$50 million and eligible for the JobKeeper Payment. Rent reductions will be based on the tenant’s decline in turnover to ensure that the burden is shared between landlords and tenants.



The policy will include a mutual obligation requirement on small and medium sized businesses and not-for-profit tenants to continue to engage their employees through the JobKeeper Payment where eligible, and if applicable, provide rent relief to their subtenants.

Australian and foreign banks, along with other financial institutions operating in Australia, are expected to support landlords and tenants with appropriate flexibility as they work to implement the mandatory Code.

The Federal Government is waiving rents for all its small and medium enterprises and not-for-profit tenants within its owned and leased property across Australia.

The Code and its principles will be implemented and regulated by the South Australian Government.

To complement this support, meet the new code requirements and demonstrate goodwill,

Council is offering a 3 month period of no rent for eligible commercial and minor commercial tenants in Council owned buildings, effective 1 April 2020.

Given the duration of this rent relief is 3 months in the first instance, there is an option to extend depending on prevailing circumstances at the time. The timelines of the pandemic, government restrictions and longer term impact are all current unknowns.

Maximising the value of publically owned assets is important to demonstrate best value to ratepayers. In these unprecedented circumstances, the importance of return on investment balanced with supporting ongoing business viability (as future tenants), is critical. For this reason, Council is assisting the cash flow of tenants to ensure their best chance of ‘survival’ until the peak trade period of summer. Analysis indicates the Alexandrina Economic profile is exposed to greater economic impact as a result of the impact on tourism, and a number

of Council’s tenants are tourism related businesses. Feedback from tenants indicates this rent relief will greatly assist their businesses ‘survive’ and prepare for the re-building phase once through the peak of the crisis.

Twenty-five (25) commercial tenants and six (6) minor commercial tenants (community groups) have been categorised into either high or low risk, dependant on the expected impact the business type will incur. ‘High’ category includes Food and Tourism related businesses and ‘Low’ category includes Marina, Government agency, Service Sector, Service Station and Cropping. The value of these tenants is shown in **Table 3**.

Rate Relief – At this stage requests for rate relief are being addressed in line with Council’s Hardship Policy on a case by case basis. Council is keeping abreast of announcements made as part of stimulus packages and will reconsider rate relief further if required.

Economic Development and Events Recovery Grant Fund

Council will consider funding a short term ‘local stimulus recovery package’, commencing July for a dedicated Alexandrina Economic Development and Events Recovery grant fund as part of its 2020–21 budget deliberations. The fund would be open to applications from:

- Local Businesses for new activities that will generate growth.
- Local Community organisations to assist facilitate more events and/or larger events that strengthen the community and attract visitors.

It is envisaged the program would be a 1–2 year ‘seed funding’ commitment to assist business and community groups regroup and build. As an example, a \$100,000 Grant fund with access to a grant of up to a maximum of \$5,000 would enable at last 20 new initiatives to surface across the region. Criteria defining eligibility is under development and a supportive application process will be created.

Current Initiatives

Local Buy Procurement Policy

The Procurement Policy was recently reviewed (October 2019) with a view to strengthening our support for local businesses. The Procurement Policy makes allocation for a 15% weighting for local suppliers. In addition, Council increased its focus on supporting local suppliers to better engage with Council, this included hosting a number of ‘Doing Business with Council’ sessions in late 2019. Council will include further training programs to assist suppliers meet requirements as part of a suite of business capability workshops running out of the Business Enterprise Centre later in 2020.

Terms of Payment

In order to support local suppliers, Alexandrina Council has committed to paying all suppliers within Alexandrina, Yankalilla and Victor Harbor Council boundaries within 14 days. For those suppliers who have a shorter payment term than 14 days, the payment term remains unchanged.

Business Hotline

Our top priority is two-way information flow between business and Council. This will assist us to understand the best way to respond and inform future economic development and re-building initiatives.

Council has therefore set up a Business Hotline on 8555 7455 to assist businesses with support as well as to collect pertinent commercial information. It represents an opportunity to recognise it is a challenging time for our business community and allows them to speak to a person at the end of a telephone line regarding Council support and where to find other information.

The hotline is not for staff to give professional business advice as they are not qualified to do this. The role is focused on answering questions relating to Council support relief / initiatives and directing the caller to Federal and State government initiatives. Business information, sentiment and data will be collected and this will assist us communicate regularly going forward as well as inform future support.

Online Resources for Business

We are constantly monitoring and updating emerging information and restriction updates as well as new support and funding opportunities. Trusted government websites, government funded initiatives and other online resources provide useful information for business and industry.

These are made available on Council’s website under the COVID-19 update page and Business page at alexandrina.sa.gov.au/business

Marketing and Promotions – ‘Open for Business’

An audit has been undertaken of food related businesses in the region that are still able to trade by providing take away or delivery services. This informed a list that is now being updated weekly and promoted via multiple channels to the community, including in hard copy to isolated members of the community who might not be digitally connected, allowing them access to information so they can phone and order delivery.

Scope an ‘Alexandrina Business Digital Economy Strategy’

With an already ‘flat lining’ Gross Regional Product, the Alexandrina Council recognises the further impact recent government restrictions, resulting from the coronavirus pandemic have had on the business community’s ability to trade. This is on top of the longer lasting and broader challenges online retail and emerging digital technology was already having on the traditional, shop front businesses in the region.

Global media company Forbes, is often held up as a credible international thought leading publication focused on business, investing, technology, entrepreneurship, leadership and lifestyle. Increasing the digital capabilities of the Alexandrina business community is a necessity more than ever now, to ensure their survival and success in the future. The 2020 coronavirus pandemic is an unprecedented event and will change consumer behaviour, expectations and understanding. It is an economic shock requiring a 'step change' response from industry, and Council can play a role to support this.

The economic development function of Council is currently focused on providing stability for local businesses so as to minimise the direct impact of the pandemic, whilst building their ability and resilience through innovation for future development and growth.

Council is currently scoping an overarching Alexandrina Business Digital Economy Strategy to support and grow the Small to Medium Sized Enterprises in the region (SMEs). The Strategy is intended to provide a two year roadmap delivering the objectives of the Economic Development Strategy 2016 – 2022 (under ‘midpoint’ review currently). Supporting the successful transition of businesses online, upskilling their capability and capitalising on the opportunities presenting in the rapidly emerging digital economy, is critical.

The strategy will include a list of priority projects which will form the basis of a pro-active approach by Council, business and key regional stakeholders. The strategy will be a suite of inter-related projects including training and education for awareness raising and ‘self-help’ activities,

brand and digital platform development, and an online marketing campaign.

The digital marketing component will collectively promote local goods and services and will be a key element to the strategy’s effectiveness. Reducing economic ‘leakage’ from the region is an important starting point for growing a strong economy. Community pride leads to third party endorsement and increased interest, and this initiative will provide a platform to enable this. The community can play an important role by sharing their positive experiences and favourite businesses.

The training component will be facilitated through Council's new Business Enterprise Centre (from 1 July 2020), immediately increasing business digital and online capability, and will be a key pillar of the Economic Development strategy post its mid-point review.

Temporary On Street Parking Controls

Council has relaxed, and is investigating temporarily changing on-street parking time limits on key mainstreet precincts to support local businesses to better accommodate pick up as well as encourage a quick turnaround of customers. It will require setting up dedicated 'pick-up' zones for takeaway food in front of relevant businesses. The expected impact to other customer parking is limited given customers cannot dwell and need to minimise their time and physical distancing in public spaces. It is proposed to limit timed parking on relevant streets to 30 minutes along appropriate sections of:

- Cadell St, Goolwa
- High St, Dawson St and Commercial Rd, Strathalbyn
- North Tce, Port Elliot.

This will remain in place only until government restrictions are lifted. Businesses will be consulted on the changes and promoted by a public notice in local newspapers, Council’s website and social media, and other channels in affected areas.



Getting Alexandrina businesses actively online is more important than ever.



Planning Assistance

Alexandrina Council is currently reviewing and adapting its Development Assessment process to facilitate electronic assessment (ePlanning), which will streamline the assessment process for all Applications. It is anticipated that this process will be completed and in operation by the end of April 2020.

In addition, Council's Development Assessment Planners remain on call to provide development related advice. Our Planners may be able to assist with prioritising your Development Application or issuing temporary consents to assist COVID-19 affected businesses to adapt the way they operate (subject to meeting relevant statutory obligations). Small Business Friendly Council

Alexandrina Council is embarking on the necessary steps to be recognised by the State Government as a Small Business Friendly Council.

Business Enterprise Centre

The decision to establish and deliver a Business Enterprise Centre (focused on supporting local business) has been extremely fortuitous and is forward thinking in its delivery, given the service will be much needed and

likely to be heavily relied on by the business community as the local economy moves from survival, to recovery and rebuild.

Economic Development Strategy Review

Completion of the mid-point review of the Alexandrina Economic Development Strategy 2016 – 2020 remains an important priority. The review has commenced, with stakeholder consultation underway when the pandemic restrictions limited progress. This will be actively pursued with a strategic approach to a recovery plan viewed as a critical outcome.

Investigate and Source External Funding Opportunities

It is important Council plans for the longer term and is adequately prepared for the economic rebuild phase once the pandemic is over. Council continues to actively pursue external funding to bring forward and fast track key identified strategic projects.

These projects can employ local labour and contractors through the construction phase as well as create key community and tourism infrastructure. This will also ensure an increased standard of living for the community and that quality infrastructure is in place to attract tourism, businesses and investment.

Medium Term Initiatives

For the purpose of this Business Support Package and to guide Council's efforts and resources, medium term initiatives and activities are defined as occurring between July and December 2020.

Activity includes reviewing and evaluating financial relief measures put in place, implementing medium term initiatives previously scoped and securing funding for larger scale 'rebuilding' infrastructure projects.

Deliver an Alexandrina Business Digital Economy Strategy

Build on the Alexandrina 'Shop Local' campaign phase 1 (piloted in May – June) to involve other types of business as a key demonstration to local businesses of tangible benefits arising in the digital economy.

Council will partner with other agencies to secure external expertise to deliver digital training, and the program will be delivered through the Business Enterprise Centre, and remotely.

It will be important to establish a Business Leaders group who include 'digital champions' and sector representatives for the long term sustainability of the initiatives that are embraced.

Investigate and Source External Funding Opportunities

Continue to monitor opportunities to secure external funding sources to match Council pre-commitments to approved master plans and projects.



Longer Term Initiatives

Activity and initiatives post 2020 will be actions identified to support objectives of the new Economic Development Strategy. These actions will build on the activity outlined in this package to date.

Given the rapidly emerging environment at time of writing, forecasting this far ahead is difficult and likely to change. Regardless, monitoring the impact and effectiveness of previously mentioned initiatives will be ongoing. In addition, there will likely be the entering of a construction phase of large scale infrastructure projects if external funding has been secured.
